OSCAR - THE MUSICAL

ACT ONE



The Musical opens with a reflective look by an old Lord Alfred Douglas (Bosie), *The Dead Poet*, then a glimpse into the future, with a snippet of *The Ballad Of Reading Gaol*.

Oscar Wilde was born in Dublin on 16 October 1854, the younger son of Jane Francesca Wilde (Speranza) and Sir William Wilde. Oscar excelled as a student and arrived in London via Trinity College Dublin and Oxford University.

To the backdrop of a society ball in **To Be Seen**, Oscar prepares for an evening in the company of his mother and socialites such as Lillie Langtry and the artist James Whistler. Oscar and Whistler's competition for the attention of their peers becomes personal in **The Gentle Art** and Whistler cannot contain his envy of Oscar's popularity: **Whistler's Song**.

Despite his fame, Oscar had no income. He accepts D'Oyly Carte's offer of a lecture tour of the United States in *Patience* and uses the opportunity to espouse his philosophy that life is art; *Declaring His Genius*. Returning with his reputation enhanced, Oscar courts Constance Lloyd. She returns his affections in *Constance's Song* and the couple marry in 1884.

In the following years, Oscar becomes a father to two sons and his reputation increases, particularly with the publication of A Picture of Dorian Gray: *Centre Of Attention*. At the same time he spends more time in the company of young men and Bosie in particular: *The Café*.

Bosie gives an indication of his hedonistic life in *The High Life*.

Oscar ignores the warnings of a devoted friend, Robert Ross, in *1895* and Constance and Speranza when they lament *He Used To Bring Me Flowers*. Rumours reach Bosie's father, The Marquess of Queensbury and he confronts Oscar in *Oscar And The Marquess*.

Oscar reflects on his personal life in *Love Under Pressure* while his public life hits a new height with the opening of **The Importance Of Being Earnest**. The Marquess continues to challenge Oscar's life style and leaves him a note "To Oscar Wilde – posing as a somdomite [sic]". In *Oscar's Choice*, he considers whether or not to sue the Marquess for libel.

ACT TWO

Oscar prosecutes the Marquess, but his initial flippancy in *The Trial* does not withstand Sir Edward Carson's cross-examination and Oscar is compelled to withdraw his case when witnesses testify to his lifestyle. The evidence leads to Oscar's prosecution for 'gross indecency' and he is once again the *Centre Of Attention*. He reflects with Constance that he is *Ahead Of My Time* before being found guilty in *The Sentence: Justice And Moderation* and being sentenced to two years hard labour. Constance and Speranza again offer a lamentation through a reprise of *He Used To Bring Me Flowers*.

The Ballad Of Reading Gaol charts Oscar's time in prison, including the hanging of a fellow inmate, news of his mother's death and a visit from Constance.

Upon his release, Oscar finds himself alone, unwelcome in England and estranged from Constance and Bosie: *The Letters*. Ross, tries to comfort Oscar in *Sign Of The Times* whilst Constance reflects on *The Best Years Of My Life* before her death in 1898. Meanwhile, Bosie revels in succeeding to his father's title in *The High Life*.

Oscar's last days in Paris are spent alone. Former associates are surprised by his appearance and avoid him: In *Remember*, Oscar struggles to recall his former glory.

Oscar Wilde died on 30 November 1900; The Finale.

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MESSAGE FROM THE WRITERS

As school friends, drinking partners and committed Spurs fans, we did not tread the traditional path to musical theatre. However, the tragic life of Oscar Wilde is such a compelling story that writing $\bigcap S \bigcap \Delta R$ was as natural for us as seeing England get knocked out of another world cup.

Once completed, we were overwhelmed by the support of family and friends who helped us produce an amateur performance at the Intimate Theatre, London N13 in 1990. Subsequent productions included shows at the UK Festival of Musicals and the Tricycle Theatre, Kilburn which generated great interest but no cash.

In 1995, James went into the recording studio to produce an OSCARCD as a coda to our work and we returned to our day jobs.

Over 15 years later, following the invention of the Internet and with the stock of CDs dwindling, the soundtrack was uploaded to Facebook and it was from here that Rebecca Taylor made contact and started the ball rolling for the current production.

Notwithstanding our dream that we would now be returning from the Caribbean to celebrate the 25th anniversary of \bigcirc \bigcirc \bigcirc \bigcirc in the West End, we would like to thank Rebecca, Nina, Bryn and everyone at Frayed Knot for their enthusiasm and hard work and to wish them all the very best for this production of OSCAR
